



IDENTIFY POSSIBLE RISKS AND HAZARDS.

The best way to identify risks and hazards is to look around, things that you should look, or ask yourself:

- Is the equipment and tools that I need to use in a good shape without any damage?
- Is the environment that I'm working in have any hazards that I should report or be aware of?
- What hazards that I have in my activities that should be in control of?



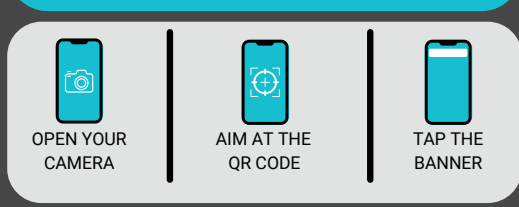
CONTROL AND MAKE CHANGES TO REDUCE THE RISK.

This step is when you need to take action and/or make changes. For example:

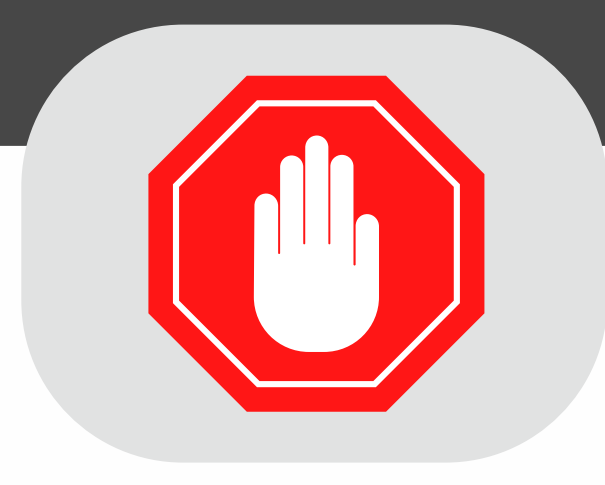
- Can I resolve the problem myself (i.e.: remove equipment from the workplace, place signs, or change the location of your station)
- Can I contact the maintenance or other department for help, or
- Do I need to forward this to my supervisor

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STOP AND THINK ABOUT YOUR SAFETY

Sometimes we jump too fast to do what we need to do without thinking about our safety or the safety of others around us. The first step is to take a moment and stop and think about what may impact your safety in your workspace.

ASSESS AND MEASURE THE LEVEL OF THE RISK.

It is important to measure the level of the risk that is applied to you or others. For example:

- How big is this hazard (in quantity, i.e.: how many gallons of hazardous substance, how much water on the floor, how much noise)?
- How many hazards are you exposed to?
- If you are impacting others, how many people are exposed?
